Julie and I missed our July meeting as we were at the Michigan Antique Radio Club (MARC) Extravaganza Kalamazoo. Michigan. The meet began with the set-up, the picking up registration materials at about 3 PM. I had pre-registered online and early, which was confusing for me, as I am used to seeing where I wrote a check to know that I had preregistered. They did not have

a packet ready for me, but I was on the list, so they got me fixed up with table space and name tags fairly quickly.

We got our sale items unloaded and set up. Quite a few vendors set up throughout the afternoon and evening, but no selling was allowed until 8 AM on Friday. So if there was something you wanted, you had to make note of it and be ready to purchase the next morning. I had selected four items I wanted, and was able to get them the next morning, but the price had increased on one of them. Then later, of course, I found a few other items, but the first four were what made the trip worthwhile. The event was held in a large exhibit hall giving us plenty of room, but not all of the tables were filled. We were able to spread out to the one next to us. The auction began at 2 PM, but was very poor. There were few items, so it lasted only an hour. The problem was there was an entry fee for each item as well as a 10% commission, so items were held for the silent auctions on Saturday. Many items did not get a bid, and others had high minimums. Some complete console radios would not bring \$5. I purchased just one item plus a console and a victrola for parts. The contest had some very impressive items, even though there were only a few categories. There were many items I had never seen, including advertising for a Zenith item I had never even heard about. On Saturday, there were just a few new vendors, and some nearby collectors had been home to get more items. But generally the flea market was not as active as on Friday, even though the public was welcome. I sold my most expensive item, a TV-7 tube tester. The first silent auction ended about noon. I only won one item, and there were many items with no bids that would be held over for the second silent auction. In the past I won quite a few items at reasonable prices at the silent auc-

tion, but not this year. We packed up and headed for home before the second silent auction ended. At 3 o'clock there was an auction for all the donated items. I left some of my unsold items there, and it looked like there was some good stuff available, but I made an effort to not look too hard, as I knew we needed to hit the road. MARS has held some other one day events that were located closer to Michigan population which were very well attended. Also another item not liked about the meet, is that the hotels are all fairly remote from the location, so it takes 10 minutes to get there. There was talk of moving the event elsewhere this next year, but we likely will attend.


Elena then showed us a RCA model T7-5 tombstone style table radio. It was in rough shape and she kindly donated it to the auction. Ray and Dorothy bought it, and we are looking forward to the transformation they will make in restoring it.



Elena also donated one of the strangest devices ever to show up in our junk auction. It was a Pro Studio Industrial Sound Pressure System. Sounds impressive, right? It looks like a big speaker cabinet that might be used as part of an amplifier system for a rock group, but it is just a very sturdy empty cabinet! We could not find any openings anywhere, or any evidence that anything was ever inside of it. Perhaps it was a resonance cavity?

Ray and Dorothy bought it, and we are looking forward to the transformation they will make in restoring it.

Your club secretary displayed a 1927 Stewart-Warner model 385 six-tube TRF battery powered receiver. It's typical of the sort of single knob battery sets made in the brief (about 1 year) period between the end of the three-knob battery set era and the beginning of the AC era. I picked it up for twenty dollars, minus tubes and a few screws but including a lot of dirt and grime. However, It cleaned up quite good.
